Board Notes

After deciding in a March 16 special meeting to close the Library until April 1 because of COVID-19, the board had a videoconference using Zoom on April 1 to discuss how best to respond to the uncertainties presented by the coronavirus.

The board considered how best to balance safety with the need to provide Library services to the community. After much discussion, the board made the following decisions:

1. The Library will remain closed until the end of May, or until it is safe to reopen.

2. Jen will work from home while the Library is closed.

3. The Volunteer Appreciation Luncheon for this year is postponed indefinitely; instead a thank you note and token of appreciation will be sent to volunteers, members and other supporters.

4. The annual Rare and Old Book Sale, scheduled for Memorial Day Weekend, is cancelled. Depending on what happens with the virus, the Library may still be closed and there may still be limitations on public gatherings.

5. This year's quilt drawing is also cancelled. Ticket sales depend on tourists, and there will probably not be enough traffic to justify the effort to sell tickets.

6. The Fourth of July Sale is tentatively still on the schedule. It may be a shorter sale, depending on available books and volunteers.

7. The May 6 Membership Meeting is cancelled. Annual elections take place during the May Meeting, which is usually the annual meeting which we are required to convene as an Oregon corporation. The required annual meeting and annual elections are postponed until the Membership Meeting on September 2.

Too Beautiful for Butts!

The March Membership Meeting featured Lolly Champion, who gave a talk titled 'Cannon Beach--Too Beautiful for Butts.' She described her efforts to rid our streets, sidewalks and beaches of unsightly cigarette butts. Champion has raised money for cigarette butt receptacles that are attached to public trash cans. She mails the butts collected in the receptacles to Dow Chemical and R.J. Reynolds so they will dispose of them safely. Champion also has created informational flyers explaining how dangerous cigarette butts are to gulls and puffins.



Prior to Champion's talk, four-month-old Donald John Hess, and his mother Emma, received three books as part of the Library's 'Books for Babies' program. This program presents copies of *The Velveteen Rabbit*, *Goodnight Moon*, and *Make Way for Ducklings* to babies under the age of one, and their parents, who are residents of Cannon Beach or Arch Cape.

Changes for NW Author Series

Because of shelter-at-home orders and limits on meetings, the NW Authors Speaker Series committee has rescheduled speakers originally scheduled for March, April, and May.

Marianne Monson, who was scheduled to read in March from her new novel *Her Quiet Revolution* about America's first woman state senator, will instead help us celebrate the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage on Saturday, August 8.

Award-winning nature reporter Apricot Irving had planned to discuss her novel *A Gospel of Trees* in April. She will instead join us in October on a date yet to be determined.

Seaside native Karl Marlantes, who had been scheduled to appear at the Library in May, will discuss his work with us on Saturday November 28. Marlantes writes about his wartime experiences, as well as about the logging industry and life in small town Oregon.



Celebrating Local and Regional Writers

The second annual Writers Read Celebration drew a standing-room-only crowd on Friday evening, February 28. Twelve writers hailing from Cannon Beach, Manzanita, Astoria, Wheeler, Portland, Oregon City, Washington State and Stockton, California, found an enthusiastic audience as they read poems, essays and stories describing walks along the beach, night-time clam diggers, dead birds, and other topics.

John Ciminello, Kenneth Robert Class, Darrell Clukey, Ellis Conklin, Mindy Hardwick, Kay Limbird, Phyllis Mannan, Jean McGonigle, Jennifer Nightingale, Ruth Muldoon Reno, Kay Stoltz, and L. Swartz were selected from over two dozen writers who submitted work dealing with the theme 'Views from the North Coast.' All the essays, poems and stories submitted for consideration have been collected in a notebook available for reading in the Library.
