Board Notes

The March board meeting was conducted in person, after many months of Zoom meetings, and addressed a wide variety of issues. Patrons have asked to be able to renew books online, without having to call or email the Library Office. The board agreed that was a good idea and should be part of the update of the Library website.

Prior to Covid, a library card gave patrons the ability to check out a total of 10 items, including no more than 4 DVDs/audio books, and no more than 2 Green Dot books. This limit was decreased when the Library only offered Door-Side Service or very Limited Browsing. The board decided it was time to return to pre-Covid limits.

Ballots for the election of board members and officers will be mailed out April 4th, along with a Voters' Guide with information about each candidate. Also included will be membership renewal forms, so that Members can send in dues for 2022-23.

Upcoming fundraisers were discussed. The Library will observe the Spring Unveiling by offering art and music books for sale. Plans are underway for the Rare and Old Book Sale over the Memorial Day weekend. Volunteers are needed to help with the sale. Volunteers will also be needed to sell quilt drawing tickets at the Farmer's Market on days designated by the Farmer's Market Committee.

The board discussed whether Cannon Beach Reads should be able to start meeting in-person in the Library, and decided that was all right as long as appropriate measures are taken to assure CB Reads members' safety. A community member has proposed a preschooler storytime at the Library. The board thought this was a great idea and asked that the details and logistics be worked out.

Board members discussed various options for thanking volunteers, since we are not doing a volunteer appreciation luncheon. The board discussed inperson Membership Meetings, and decided to do an Continued page 3...

His latest novel is a finalist for the 2022 Aspen Words Literary Prize and the 2022 Oregon Book Award. He lives in Portland, Oregon.

Election Ballots Mailed

Ballots for the upcoming Board of Directors election were mailed on April 4. All library members with current paid membership dues (May 2021 to May 2022) should have received a packet containing a ballot, voter's guide, return envelope, and renewal form for next vear.

Library members vote for board officers and members-at-large. This year there are 4 returning candidates running for the 4 officer positions. There are 6 candidates running for 5 open member-at-large positions – 3 are returning, and 3 are new nominees. The voter's guide has details about candidates.

If you think your dues were paid for the year, but did not receive a ballot, contact our Office Manager as soon as possible. Only those ballots received in the library office by Friday, May 6 will be counted.



WOHR Library Lecture Series

Join us Wednesday April 13th at 7:00 p.m. on Facebook Live @Friends of Haystack for the World of Haystack Rock Library Lecture Series. Hillary Burgess, Monitoring Coordinator for NOAA's Marine Debris Program, and Jesse Jones, volunteer coordinator for CoastWatch, will present, "Tackling Marine Debris with Citizen Science: NOAA's Marine Debris Monitoring and Assessment Project in Oregon." They will discuss MDMAP (a nationwide network of volunteers), NGOs, agency and academic personnel who contribute to and use the data collected through shoreline marine debris monitoring. Data collection outcomes include improved understanding of where and when marine debris accumulates, assessment of legislation like bag bans and container deposits, and development of behavior change campaigns that target source reduction of items like shotgun wads. The more data, the greater the impact. CoastWatch is actively seeking to set up more monitoring sites in Oregon. Come learn how shoreline marine debris monitoring can be used to address the shoreline pollution problem, and how you can get involved.

Cannon Beach Reads April 20

The April selection for Cannon Beach Reads is Notes from a Small Island, by William McGuire (Bill) Bryson, which, depending on the consensus of regular CB Reads participants, might be discussed in person at the Library on April 20, beginning at 7 p.m. If the group decides on



an in-person meeting, arrangements will be made so that those who would rather join the discussion via Zoom will be able to do so.

Notes from a Small Island is Bryson's account of his tour of the UK after living in Britain for 20 years. First published in 1996, the book recounts his travels, mostly on public transportation, to all parts of the UK. Bryson provides historical information about the areas he visits, as well as comments regarding the character of the British people, and the peculiarities of British English. The book was voted by listeners of BBC4 as the work that best sums up British identity and the state of the nation.

Bill Bryson, a travel writer and author of books about science and about the English language, is known for his incisive and humorous writing style. Born in Des Moines, Iowa, Bryson has spent most of his adult life in the UK, earning dual citizenship in 2015. He is an Officer of the Order of the British Empire and the only non-Brit to be named an honorary member of the Royal Society. He has also been awarded 11 honorary doctorates from British and American universities.

Bryson has written about travels in America (Notes from a Big Country, and A Walk in the Woods) and about the English language (Mother Tongue and Made in America). His book about the history, origins, and status of the sciences (A Short History of Nearly Everything) has won numerous awards.

Looking for a Good Mystery?

If you are looking for an exciting read, think about exploring works by two prolific authors whose works live on, not just because of their quality, but because other writers are continuing their work: Dick Francis and Robert B. Parker.

Dick Francis drew on his experiences as a highly successful British jockey for his thrillers, all of which focus on crime in the horse racing world. Unlike many other authors of mysteries and thrillers, Francis did not create a series focused on an individual hero. Instead his books are narrated by the main character of each novel, who is usually a jockey, or a trainer, or, sometimes, a professional from another field who is somehow involved with horse racing. During the course of the novel, the hero learns that he is actually capable and resourceful, and he is able to find salvation for himself and others.

Francis's first thriller, *Dead Cert*, was published in 1962. He went on to write a book a year (except for a short story collection in 1998) until *Under Orders* in 2006; 40 titles in all. He then wrote 4 novels with his son Felix (Dead Heat, Silks, Even Money, Crossfire), Felix Francis has continued to write racing related thrillers with his father's name in the title; the tenth, and latest, was Iced: A Dick Francis Novel in 2021.

Unlike Francis, Robert B. Parker is known for the two series he created around two compelling, strong characters, notably Spenser, and Jesse Stone. He also wrote 6 novels about Sunny Randall, a female private detective, and 4 westerns.

Parker created 40 novels featuring Boston private detective Spenser, starting with *The Gudwulf* GODWULF MANUSCRIP' Manuscript in 1973 and ending with Sixkill in 2011. Spenser, a former infantryman, boxer, and state trooper, is highly educated, smart mouthed, and almost painfully ethical. Spenser often calls on his friend Hawk, a hired gun, to help him in dangerous situations, and on his girlfriend, Susan Silverman to help him with ethical dilemmas. Even Parker's early novels feel modern because of his inclusion of multi-racial, multi-ethnic, and gay characters. Since Parker's death, Ace Atkins has continued the series, with 10 Spenser novels so far.

Parker also created Jesse Stone, a former L.A. detective who has sought sobriety and a second chance as the police chief in a small New England town. Parker wrote 9 Jesse Stone novels, starting with Night Passage in 1997 and ending with Split Image in 2010. As with the Spenser series, Jesse Stone did not disappear when Parker died. Eleven more Jesse Stone novels have been written, three by Michael Brandman, 6 by Reed Farrell Coleman, and 2 by Mike Lupica. Both the Spenser novels and the Jesse Stone books have been adapted to television and films.

So, when you are browsing the mystery shelves, consider two authors whose works are so compelling they have continued long after the authors themselves have left us.


