Board Notes

The board met in person for the April meeting. Appeal letter donations are still coming in, and sales from the Book Sale Room are at pre-pandemic levels.

Now that Seaside Library is once again giving us access to the national interlibrary loan network, use of Interlibrary Loan (ILL) service has increased. Office Manager Jen Dixon proposed a policy regarding patrons who do not return ILL books, or who consistently return them late.

The board agreed to file an application with the federal Emergency Connectivity Fund (ECF). The ECF was created in response to COVID. Because of the pandemic, access to the internet and other online resources became increasingly important; the ECF provides funds to increase access. The ECF has been opened to libraries, and we will apply for 5 hot spots which patrons will be able to check out.

Board members were reminded that Karl Marlantes will give the last NW Author Speaker Series talk of the year. It will be at the Coaster Theatre on Saturday, May 7 at 2 p.m. Plans for staffing and advertising the Rare and Old Book Sale were discussed.

The board decided to do a children's summer reading program this year. We will use the materials from IREAD; the theme this year is 'read beyond the beaten path.'

The board decided that Red Dot books (books that aren't recently published but are new to the library) will be kept on the 'Red Dot' shelf for 6 months and then shelved in the regular collection.


About half of the Membership have returned their ballots. Jen will send out a reminder email.

Karl Marlantes is the author of the internationally bestselling novel *Matter*horn. His latest work, Deep River, is a fascinating historical fiction that explores the wild landscapes of the logging industry, canneries, and labor organizations on the Columbia River in Oregon and Wash-

ington in the early 20th century. The book follows three immigrant siblings as they struggle to build a new identity while still holding on to their Finnish roots.

Born in Astoria, Marlantes grew up in Seaside and attended Seaside High School, where he was student body president. Marlantes also attended Yale University. He was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship to Oxford University and earned a master's degree. Marlantes has also received a Bronze Star, two Navy commendation medals for valor, two Purple Hearts, and 10 Air Medals.

Volunteer Spotlight: Lynne Murray Stuart

Lynne Murray Stuart is retiring from the board this year. She has also served as the Board Vice President for several years. Lynne's quick wit, graciousness, and sagacity have helped



shape the board over the years. We asked Lynne to reflect on her time volunteering for the library.

How did you become interested in volunteering for the library?

Libraries have always been important to me, and I've made it a habit to seek out libraries all over the world. When I lived in Scotland I went to the Edinburgh library and read all the children's history books for a quick catch up about the country's heroes.

Can you tell us how you spent your career?

Before I moved to Cannon Beach I lived in Montana where I taught elementary school, worked for the state of Montana, and owned a country inn. Montana is beautiful, however the day it was 36 below zero and had snowed 100 more inches on the mountains is the day that I decided to leave. On my "town must have" moving list was a library, a coffee shop, and an ocean. Cannon Beach made the cut. Soon after I moved here, I started volunteering at the library when at the time the card catalogue was being entered into the library computer system. It was a massive project and a great time to get to know the collection and the other volunteers.

Can you offer any advice to Board's Vice Presidents that will follow you?

As vice president I did fill in briefly when Phyllis hurt her shoulder, however the biggest task for the Vice President is finding speakers for the membership meetings. Cannon Beach has many interesting people with unusual careers and experiences. The difficulty is just putting it all together to present them at the monthly meetings. The membership meetings tie many of the library activities together and it is an important and unique library activity.

Is there any one library project you worked on that stands out as the most meaningful?

Cannon Beach Reads May 18

The May selection for Cannon Beach Reads is *Animal Farm*, by George Orwell, which will be discussed via Zoom on Wednesday, May 18, beginning at 7 p.m.

GEORGE ORWELL Animal Farm

Animal Farm is an allegory about a group of farm animals who rebel against their human owners and then seek to establish a society where all animals can be equal and free. In

ciety where all animals can be equal and free. Instead, their efforts result in a dictatorship.

Orwell published *Animal House* in 1945, as a satirical critique of Joseph Stalin, who at the time was popular in the UK for fighting Nazi Germany. Orwell, a staunch anti-communist, noted that in writing the book, he had tried "to fuse political purpose and artistic purpose into one whole."

George Orwell was the pen name of Eric Arthur Blair, a novelist, journalist and critic. Orwell's fiction, nonfiction, and essays reflect his opposition to totalitarianism and authoritarian governments. He is perhaps best known for *Nineteen Eighty-Four*, a dystopian novel that has given us terms like 'Orwellian,' 'Big Brother,' and 'doublethink.'

Orwell documented his experience with working class life in industrial England in *The Road to Wigan Pier*, and his experience as a soldier in the Spanish Civil War in *Homage to Catalonia*. He was also a well respected literary critic. Orwell has been described as having "uncompromising intellectual honesty" and as being the "saint of common decency."

Looking for a Good Mystery?

If you have never picked up a mystery by Ann Cleeves, you are missing a good read. As newlyweds, Cleeves and her husband were the only inhabitants of a nature reserve on a small tidal island. Cleeves turned to writing as a way to deal with the isolation. And millions of readers are grateful that she did.

Cleeves produced two mystery series during the 1980s and 1990s. She wrote eight books about elderly private detectives and bird watchers George and Molly Palmer-Jones; and produced six novels featuring Northumbrian Detective Inspector Stephen Ramsay. Both series are now back in print.

But it was in 1999 that her writing career took off, when she published *The Crow Trap*, her first novel featuring Vera Stanhope. Vera, a Detective Inspector with the Northumberland and City Police, is a gifted and driven investigator. She is socially inept, having been raised by her father, an isolated widower given to poaching and taxidermy.

Vera is frumpy and bad tempered, but despite her brusque exterior, she can be kind and surprisingly gentle with crime victims. Vera continues to be relentless and shrewd in solving complex crimes. The tenth Vera novel, *The Rising Tide*, will be published in 2022.

Cleeves created another successful series with her eight Shetland novels, beginning with Raven Black in 2006 and ending with Wild Fire in 2018. Set in the remote Scottish Shetland Islands, the novels center on Detective Inspector Jimmy Perez. Perez is gentle and soft-spoken, but intense and dedicated to solving the crimes that occur in these isolated islands. As a native of the Shetlands, Perez has the trust of the local population, who, because of the bleak landscape and isolation, are secretive and unwilling to trust outsiders.

Cleeves ended the Shetland series when her husband died, and considered ending her writing career. Fortunately she has kept on writing. In addition to a new Vera novel, Cleeves has started the Two Rivers series. The Long Call (2019) and The Heron's Cry (2021) feature Detective Inspector Matthew Venn. Venn grew up in North Devon, as a member of a strict religious sect. He rejected the teachings of the sect as a young man and left North Devon. Now Venn is back, and, in addition to serving as a Detective Inspector, he has to come to terms with his past and his family.

The Vera Stanhope, Shetland, and Two Rivers series have all been adapted to television, and can be seen on PBS and various streaming services.
