#### **Board Notes**

The board met on February 22nd and discussed a range of issues. Board members discussed and approved the 2023-24 budget and also discussed moving the library's contingency funds to either high yield savings accounts or CDs.

Board member Roger Neugebauer presented suggestions for fundraising and increasing membership and activity in the library.

Office Manager Jen Dixon provided an update on the electrical upgrades to the building. Corroded outdoor lighting in the front of the building has been replaced and a new light has been installed at the back of the building. Jen has met with the relevant inspectors and gotten approvals for how we can replace the electrical panel and bring the electrical system up to code without having to break through walls or move doors.

The board considered several issues concerning Desk Volunteers, including whether to require Desk Volunteers to be Members of the Library, whether there needs to be a probationary period for Desk Volunteers, and whether there is a need for a policy regarding name plates. Volunteer Coordinator Claire Landrum reported on Desk Volunteer training.

It has been difficult to get volunteers to host membership meetings, partly because we got a late start planning for membership meetings after COVID. Another reason may be because we had no membership meetings for two-and-a-half years so new Members have no experience with meetings and don't know what to expect. Board members discussed what resources might be helpful to provide for meeting hosts.

The Ad Hoc Bylaws Review Committee reported on their progress to date. Board members provided

feedback to the Committee as they continue their deliberation. Planning for the Volunteer Appreciation Luncheon on Wednesday, April 5, is continuing.

Heinz will discuss her book *Mahjong:*A Chinese Game and the Making of
Modern American Culture, which charts
the American history of the Chinese
parlor game Mahjong.


Mahjong is a complex journey through one game's history, as Heinz considers how individuals connect, create, and experience cultural change in their daily lives.

Annelise Heinz is a historian at the University of Oregon. Her work was featured by NPR and The Wall Street Journal and was a finalist for the Oregon Book Award in Nonfiction. She has lived and played mahjong in the United States and Southwestern China.



#### Cannon Beach Reads March 15

The Cannon Beach Reads book club will meet at 7 p.m., Wednesday, March 15, to discuss "The Shallows: What the Internet is Doing to Our Brains," by Nicholas Carr. This is a hybrid meeting; participants can join in person in the library or online through use of



Zoom and a webcam conferencing system.

In "The Shallows," Carr argues that, because the brain changes in response to experiences (a concept known as 'neuroplasticity'), the use of technologies to find, store and share information can literally reroute the pathways in the brain and thus change the way we process information.

According to Carr every intellectual tool—a map, a book, a search engine—carries with it a set of assumptions about the nature of knowledge and intelligence. He argues that, while the printed book focuses attention and promotes deep and creative thought, the Internet encourages the rapid sampling of small bits of information from many sources.

As a result, argues Carr, people are becoming proficient at scanning and skimming information quickly and efficiently, but are losing the mental capacity for concentration, contemplation and reflection, a development Carr finds disturbing.

Nicholas Carr is an American author who writes thought-provoking, often-controversial books and essays about technology, business and culture. His other books include "Does IT Matter?" "The Big Switch: Rewiring the World, from Edison to Google," "The Glass Cage: Automation and Us" and "Utopia is Creepy: and Other Provocations."

Darrell Clukey will lead the discussion of "The Shallows" which will begin at 7 p.m. on Wednesday evening, March 15, at the library. #### **Looking for a Good Mystery?**

The Miss Fisher mysteries by Kerry Greenwood are a great option for readers interested in the Roaring Twenties, intrepid heroines, and glimpses of life in Australia in the early 1900s.


Kerry Greenwood is an Australian writer who is both prolific and versatile. She writes mysteries, historical fiction, children's stories, and plays. She is perhaps best known for her Miss Fisher mysteries, featuring private detective Phryne Fisher.

In the first Miss Fisher mystery, *Cocaine Blues* (1989), we learn that Miss Fisher started life as a dirt-poor child in Australia, subsisting on rabbit meat and cabbage. After the deaths during WWI of several heirs to the family fortune, Miss Fisher's father inherits an English estate and fabulous wealth. This is the same father who wanted to name her Psyche after the princess of beauty in Greek mythology, but got confused and accidentally named her after an ancient Greek courtesan.

Miss Fisher takes good advantage of her wealth, wearing glamorous clothing, flying her own airplane, entertaining a string of lovers, and driving a racy scarlet car. Miss Fisher, who never forgets her humble begin-

nings, is bored with life in English high society in 1928, especially after the excitement of driving an ambulance during WWI and living a Bohemian lifestyle in Paris. When a worried friend of the family asks her to go back to Australia to help his daughter whose husband may be slowly poisoning her, Miss Fisher jumps at the chance, and sails to Melbourne where she helps the local authorities trap an abortionist and break up a cocaine ring.

In Melbourne, Miss Fisher finds her calling as a private detective, and through 21 more novels, fearlessly, but still glamorously, solves difficult cases with the help of her loyal servants and two colorful cab drivers. The twenty-second Miss Fisher mystery, *Murder in Williamstown*, was published in 2022.

Josh McInnes from the Institute for the Oceans and Fisheries, will present "Transient Killer Whales of the Outer Coast of Oregon and California." Josh McInnes will discuss why transient killer whales are important apex predators in marine ecosystems along the Pacific coast. He will offer insights into the latest findings regarding ecology, abundance, distribution, and community structure of these whales along the outer coast and offshore waters of Oregon and California.

McInnes researches the ecology and behavior of marine mammals in British Columbia and Monterey Bay, California. His studies focus largely on the foraging behavior, diet, and ecology of transient (Bigg's) killer whales and Risso's Dolphins.
