Board Notes

The library's Board met in May. Karen French presented the Treasurer's Report for March and April. Board members voted to transfer funds from savings to a CD. Linda Sugano updated the board on acquisitions business and noted the green dot checkout rate is good.

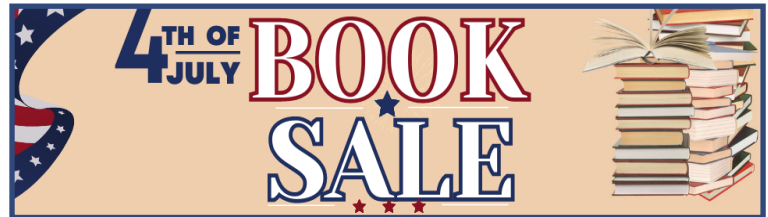
Jen Dixon presented the Office Manager's Report. She gave an update on the large outdoor sign restoration. Jen will work on an Annual Report. RM Computing has installed the new server. Roger Neugebauer presented his research on a new ILS. There was much discussion about logistics, costs, and feasibility. He and Jen will continue to investigate options.

Claire Landrum discussed the status of the back garden beautification, screens for the office and library windows, and changes to volunteer hour reporting. The Art and Music Book Sale and Rare & Old Book Sale both went well and we were able to raise funds and move inventory. Amy Jones discussed the status and needs of the upcoming July 4th Book Sale. Peggy Thom and Jen continue to plan for Summer Reading. They updated the board on programming including a bilingual story time.

In other business, Peggy is working with Janet Bates to take over managing the children's section, which will include weeding and adding an annual purchasing budget. Roger has been representing the Library in a series of Library Equity Meetings held with libraries around the state. He discussed ideas for increasing diversity and reaching out to underrepresented members of the community. He also discussed potential changes to Membership/Patron Card structure and how that might work. Phyllis will continue to write the Cannon Beach Gazette Column. The Board voted to suspend COVID vaccination requirements for volunteers.

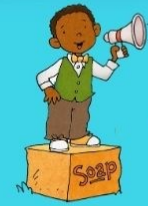

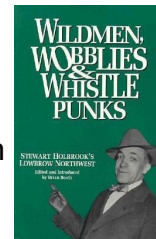


Join or Renew a Membership

Cannon Beach Reads June 21

The Cannon Beach Reads book club will discuss "Wildmen, Wobblies, and Whistle Punks: Stewart Holbrook's Lowbrow Northwest," edited by Brian Booth, starting at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, June 21. This is a hybrid meeting; participants can join in person in the library or online via Zoom.



Though virtually forgotten today, Stewart Holbrook was the nation's leading spokesperson for the Pacific Northwest during the mid-1900s. A colorful dresser, witty storyteller and irreverent social critic, Holbrook was a journalist and historian who wrote "non-stuffed shirt" history.

Born in New England, Holbrook arrived in Oregon in 1923, broke, unemployed and lacking a high school diploma. He got work as a logger, and began to submit work to the Lumber News, the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen's 4-L Bulletin, as well as the Oregonian. His work caught on and was featured in The New Yorker for over thirty years.

Holbrook's first major book, "Holy Old Mackinaw," a book of descriptive vignettes about lumberjacks from Maine to Oregon, was an instant national best-seller in 1938. Holbrook went on to write 36 books, including books about people overlooked by academic historians ("Lost Men of History") biographical sketches of the big names in the American West (Annie Oakley, Calamity Jane and Wyatt Earp) and studies of major aspects of the West ("The Story of American Railroads").

Holbrook didn't focus on successful settlers or heroic pioneers; instead he romanticized loggers, underdogs, fanatics and visionaries. He emphasized the humorous and off-beat and poked fun at stuffed shirts and hypocrites.

"Wildmen, Wobblies, and Whistle Punks" is a collection of two dozen of Holbrook's best pieces describing forgotten scandals, crimes, forest fires and floods and telling stories of workers, scoundrels, underdogs and very colorful characters.

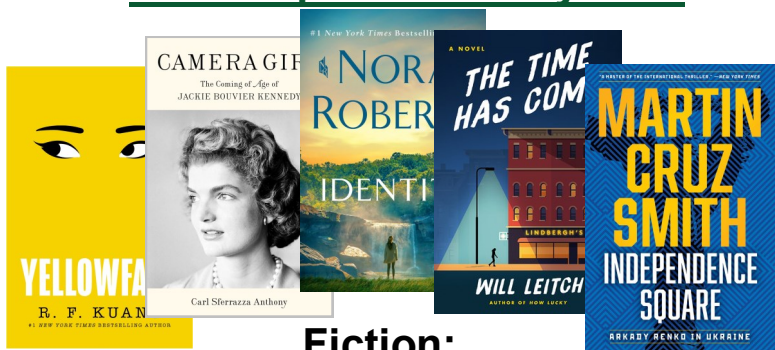
