Board Notes

Many issues were discussed at the June board meeting. Treasurer Karen French reported that the library had purchased a 7-month Certificate of Deposit. The Board Members' Code of Conduct, which was adopted several months ago, was reviewed and suggestions were made for modifications.

Board members discussed plans for this year's Fall Festival. The board decided to have a scaled-down event, with a silent auction for hotel stays and raffles for gift certificates to coffee shops, restaurants and other establishments. The event will be called a Fall Celebration and will take place on Saturday, September 30. Winners of the gift certificate raffles and of the hotel stays will be announced at 3:30 the day of the Celebration. There will also be drawings for door prizes for patrons present at 3:30. There will not be a craft sale or a bake sale. Roger Neugebauer will be in charge of coordinating the event.

Office Manager Jen Dixon reported on progress regarding the large library sign on Hemlock St. It needs major rebuilding and should be up at the beginning of August.

The Scholarship Committee gave a brief overview of the three outstanding students who received \$1,000 scholarships from the library this year.

Last minute needs for the July 4th sale were discussed. Last August, as we were coming out of covid, there was an outdoor membership gathering. Board members decided there wasn't a need for the gathering this year since regular Membership Meetings will start in September.

Jen reported that there were almost 50 participants in the Summer Reading Program so far, a new record.

Board members voted to change landscaping companies, and discussed plans for the back door pro-



ject. Everyone thanked Claire for her many hours of gardening spent cleaning up the plantings around the building.

In June the Cannon Beach Library awarded \$1,000 scholarships to three outstanding Seaside High School students, all from Cannon Beach: Mazzy Kitt Garcia, Nalu Isely, and Grace Meyer.

Kitt will begin studies at Rogue Community College and then transfer to a university to finish a four-year degree. With academic interests in museum studies and writing, Kitt plans to pursue a career as a museum curator or screenwriter. Showcasing budding curator skills, Kitt created a fossil exhibit for the Cannon Beach History Museum that will be on view until August 15th.

Nalu will attend Clatsop Community College for EMT courses and then transfer to another college to finish a degree in paramedicine. He plans to combine his interests in being outdoors, engaged, and active by becoming a firefighter and paramedic. An accomplished surfer and avid photographer, Nalu serves as a lifeguard for Cannon Beach during the summer.

Grace will attend the University of Oregon, where she will pursue her academic interests in law and business. Involved in student government and business leadership in high school, and dedicated to community service, Grace plans a career in the field of law or business. Bilingual Story Time July 27


Join us Thursday, July 27th at 2 p.m. for Bilingual Story Time, part of our summer reading special event programming. Iolanda Ramirez will explore words and

Cannon Beach Reads July 19

The members of the Cannon Beach Reads book club will meet at 7 p.m., Wednesday, July 19, to discuss "Sometimes a Great Notion," by the iconic Oregon writer, Ken Kesey. This will be a hybrid meeting; participants can come to the library or Zoom in to the discussion.



Ken Kesey is perhaps best known for writing "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" and for living a life filled with LSD parties and psychedelic bus trips, but he also wrote "Sometimes a Great Notion," a novel he regarded as his best work.

The novel tells the story of the Stamper clan, a family of almost pathologically stubborn loggers in an Oregon coastal community, whose creed is to "never give an inch," an attitude that explains their fraught relationship with both man and nature.

Arthur Broten will lead the discussion, which will start at 7 p.m., Wednesday, July 19. The Zoom link for the meeting is available by emailing Joe Bernt at bernti@ohio.edu. Coffee and cookies will be provided at the library. New members, whether in-person or online, are always welcome.
