#### **Board Notes**

# NW Authors Series: Craig Thompson

Cartoonist and graphic novel author Craig Thompson will discuss his awardwinning work at 2 p.m. Saturday, Oct.



14. The program will be offered both in person at the library and online via the library's website. Books will be available for signing and purchase.

Thompson illustrated and wrote the multiple award -winning autobiography, *Blankets*, which was named Time Magazine's No. 1 graphic novel in 2003. The memoir tells the story of a young man finding a first love and emerging from a rigorous fundamentalist Christian childhood.

The Guardian newspaper said of *Blankets*: "Quaint, meditative and sometimes dreamy, *Blankets* will take you straight back to your first kiss." kiss." Thompson's later books, *Carnet de Voyage*, *Habibi* and *Space Dump-*

*lins* have also won awards. His artwork for the Menomena album *Friend and Foe* received a Grammy nomination for best recording package.

Thompson was born in Michigan in 1975, and grew up in a rural farming community in central Wisconsin. As a child, he enjoyed the Sunday newspaper comics and comic books. He drew a comic strip for the college newspaper while attending the University of Wisconsin. Thompson currently lives in Portland.

### **Cannon Beach Reads October 18**

The Cannon Beach Reads book club will meet at 7 p.m., Wednesday, October 18, to discuss "All the Single Ladies: Unmarried Women and the Rise of an Independent Nation," by Rebecca Traister. Participants can join the discussion in person or virtually through Zoom.

In "All the Single Ladies," Traister examines what she at first thought was a uniquely twenty-first century phenomenon in America: the large number of single women. The proportion of married women in America fell below 50% in 2009 and has continued

to decline significantly, while the age at which women first marry has been steadily rising.

Traister's research, however, showed that there have been earlier periods in American history when single women were a significant portion of the population. During those periods, single women helped drive social change, including abolition, temperance and mandatory secondary education.

In addition to doing extensive historical research, Traister interviewed more than one hundred academics, social scientists and prominent single women, and considered her own experiences while being single. The result is a book that offers a thorough analysis of the social, economic, sexual and political conditions facing single women today, and that provides a historical context for those current conditions.

Critics have described "All the Single Ladies" as "informative and thought-provoking" for everyone, not just single women, and as a "remarkable portrait of contemporary American life." Traister's other books include "Big Girls Don't Cry: The Election that Changed Everything for American Women" and "Good and Mad: The Revolutionary Power of Women's Anger."

Library members, visitors, and the community observed the start of fall and the 96<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the library at our 2023 Fall Celebration. Wendy Cornelisen, Director of the Oregon State Library, sent a congratulatory message commemorating the library's milestone. According to her research, the library got by on less than \$200 in annual revenues in its earliest years, while circulating thousands of books. True to our origins, the library still circulates thousands of books annually on a very small budget. However, in modern times, we need much more than \$200 to keep the doors open.

Fundraising efforts like the Fall Celebration are possible because of generous merchants and talented volunteers. Thank you to everyone whose contributions and hard work make the library a success.


