NW Authors Series: Terry Evers


Author Terry Evers will discuss his memoir Fifteen Seasons Saturday, Nov. 11 at 2 p.m. as part of the library's NW Authors Series. This is a free. hybrid event; attend in person at the library or watch online via the library's



website. Books will be available for purchase and signing after the talk.

Terry's adventure began at just 13 years old, when his father Bruce Evers, a textbook salesman in Sa-

lem, bought a commercial dory boat. It's the first of 15 seasons salmon fishing on the Pacific Ocean, when they learn that it takes more than a boat and fishing gear to become successful fishermen.




That initial trip launched them into experiences involving harrowing Pacific

Coast storms, battles with giant king salmon and challenging fish runs that kept them either constantly working when the catch was great or bored when the catch dwindled. They met a variety of fishermen and developed a love of the fishing culture. Fifteen Seasons was featured in several newspapers, podcasts, and publications, including National Fisherman Magazine, Pacific Fishing Magazine, and Oregon Coast Magazine.

Evers has spent the past 33 years in education and is currently an elementary STEM teacher. With his dory long gone, Evers now explores Oregon and Washington rivers, lakes and bays in his Pygmy kayak. He and his wife, D'Ann, live in Keizer, Oregon.

CALL FOR SUBMISSIONS

Attention writers – Writers Read offers writers of all ages from everywhere the opportunity to write on a specific theme. This year's Writers Read theme is, "Beach Noir."

Noir detective fiction often takes place in a dark or foreboding setting, though the tone and descriptions can be unconventional or playful. Other elements may include flashes of humor, flawed underdog characters, or a crime scene. We hope you have fun with the genre!

RULES: All written formats will be accepted (essay, story, poetry, haiku, etc.). Writers may submit up to three entries, 600-word maximum per entry. A group of volunteer judges will select 10 to 12 works to be read by their authors during the Writers Read Celebration March 22, 2024. Writers chosen to read at the Celebration can read in-person or on Zoom. You don't have to live locally to participate.

Submissions will be accepted by email (preferred) or mail. Submissions should be in Word format. Include a separate cover letter with your name, email and phone number – please no contact information on the entry document. The deadline for submissions is February 2, 2024.


Free ESL Classes

Cannon Beach Reads November 15

The Cannon Beach Reads book club will meet at 7 p.m. Wednesday, November 15, to discuss "The Bridge of the Gods: A Romance of Indian Oregon," by Frederic Homer Balch. Participants may join the discussion in person at the library or virtually through Zoom.



In Balch's story, Cecil Grey, a Puritan minister in New England, has a vision of Native Americans crossing a large stone bridge over a river in the American West. Grey goes west in search of that bridge and river, finally reaching the Columbia, where he meets Chief Multnomah, a warrior who rules a vast empire and is contemptuous of Grey's message of peace and love.

"The Bridge of the Gods" recounts missionaries' attempts to convert members of Multnomah's tribe and efforts by warring tribes to form alliances in order to drive out white settlers. He also retells Native American creation myths. In the process, Balch describes the food, dress, canoes, homes, sports and religion of Northwest Native tribes.

Frederic Balch was the first Northwest writer to cast Native Americans as major characters in his writing. He also featured the beauty of the Pacific Northwest landscape, hoping to popularize Oregon as Sir Walter Scott had done for Scotland.

Balch was born in Lebanon, Oregon in 1861 and died of tuberculosis when he was 29. He had little formal education, working as a laborer to support his family when his father fell ill. An agnostic at first, Balch converted to Christianity and ultimately became a Congregationalist minister in Hood River. "Bridge of the Gods" was his only work to be published during his lifetime. "Genevieve: A Tale of Oregon" and a collection of his poetry and essays, "Memaloose," were published posthumously.
