The nominating committee reported on the slate of candidates that will be presented at the March Membership meeting.

After several years, Karen French has decided to step back from creating the directory. Caroline Godderz will be taking over that task. Board members agreed the directory should continue to be print, not digital, and discussed mailing the directory to members.

Amy Jones and Tammy Stewart will be filling vacancies on the Endowment Committee. The board approved a proposal from English Gardener for cleaning up and planting the area right behind the building. Claire Landrum will contact the City about advice regarding a tree on library property that is leaning over the handicapped parking spot in the bank lot.

Peggy Thom reported on the success of the Valentine's Day themed story time. She also reported on some of the books she has purchased with the children's library grant funds. Board members are grateful to Marty Kennedy for doing such a great job repairing the broken bookshelf unit. There was a preliminary discussion about options for replacing the aging carpeting in the main library room; Roger and Amy will explore options. Discussions will begin

about plans for future library services and needs.

Cannon Beach Reads March 20

The Cannon Beach Reads monthly book club will meet at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, March 20, to discuss "The Bean Trees," by award-winning author Barbara Kingsolver. Participants can meet for cookies and coffee at the library or join via Zoom from the comfort of home.



"The Bean Trees" is the story of Taylor Greer, a young woman who decides to find a new and better life by leaving rural Pittman County, Kentucky, and heading west in her rickety, old Volkswagen bug. Along the way, when she stops in the middle of the Cherokee Nation in Oklahoma, she is given an abused, traumatized Native American toddler whom she names Turtle and decides to raise as her own.

Taylor and Turtle eventually reach Tucson, where they meet Lou Ann Ruiz, a new mother who has been abandoned by her husband; Mattie, the owner of the Jesus Is Lord Used Tires auto-repair shop; and Esperanza and Estevan, an illegal immigrant couple from Guatemala. This unlikely assortment of friends support and help one another, working around bureaucracies, economic hardship and abusive characters as they seek to improve their lives.

Critics have called "The Bean Trees," which was Kingsolver's first novel, "an astonishing literary debut," "idealistic and exhilarating" and "(a)n overwhelming delight, as random and unexpected as real life."

Barbara Kingsolver was raised in rural Kentucky, spent two years in the Congo as a young child and now lives in southern Appalachia, where she has a large vegetable garden and raises Icelandic sheep. She holds degrees in biology, ecology and evolutionary biology from DePauw University and the University of Arizona. Her 15 books include "The Poisonwood Bible," "Pigs in Heaven," "Animal, Vegetable, Miracle: A Year of Food Life" and "Demon Copperhead," for which she won the Pulitzer Prize in 2023.

Rob will be in residence at the Coaster Theatre to complement the second weekend of his play *Death by Design*, a hilarious mystery mash-up described as "the intricate plotting of Agatha Christie meets the brilliant wit of Noel Coward." *Death by Design* runs from March 15th through April 13th at the <u>Coaster Theatre Playhouse</u> in Cannon Beach.

Nature Talks March 13

Join Friends of Haystack Rock Wednesday, March 13 at 6:00 p.m. at the Cannon Beach Chamber of Commerce for "Nature



Talks: Exploring Nature's Treasures Together." Roy Lowe will present, "Shorebirds: Elegant Travelers on Long Distance Journeys"

In spring, summer, and fall we see shorebirds using local beaches and estuaries as they pause to feed and rest during their long and demanding migrations. Shorebirds breeding in North America migrate extremely long distances to winter in the Southern Hemisphere on both sides of the Pacific Ocean. Some individuals visit two or three continents during their annual journeys. A new record for nonstop flight by a bird was recorded in 2022 when one individual was documented flying more than 8,400 miles nonstop from Alaska to Australia!

While shorebirds are very capable fliers their survival is dependent on international conservation efforts around the globe. Come learn more about these efforts, and how you can help.
